

Richland Two offers a second round of application and selection for Expanded Choice and Magnet Programs. Please read the information below very carefully to minimize any confusion about the application process.

Due to the popularity of these Choice programs, not all schools and programs are accepting applications for Choice 2. Furthermore, some programs only have openings for certain grade levels. If you apply to a grade level without openings, you are applying to be added to the wait pool. The information list below details which schools are open to Expanded Choice and where seats are currently available in our Magnet Programs. Please read this information carefully before making your application decisions.

Application Differences Between Expand Choice and Magnet Programs

There are differences in the application process for Expanded Choice and Magnet Programs. The differences are based on the selection process. Magnets offer a limited number of seats per grade level while Expanded Choice schools do not select by grade level.

If you accepted a seat in an Expanded Choice Program, you can apply for another choice option in Choice 2.

If you accepted a seat in a Magnet Program during Choice 1, you are incligible to apply for other Choice options in Choice 2.

If you applied to Magnet Programs in Choice 1, but were not selected, you do not need to re-apply in Choice 2 for the same programs. Your Choice 1 applications remain in the waiting pool.

If you applied to Magnet Programs in Choice 1, but were not selected, you can apply to different magnet programs during Choice 2. However, applying for different programs during Choice 2 will take you out of the waiting pools for your Choice 1 selections. Duplicate applications may result in a delay or even non selection to programs.

Choice Program Overview

Richland School District Two students are assigned to schools based on their residential address, they may apply to a magnet school or another school within the district through the Choice program. During application periods, parents/guardians apply online, indicating up to three schools/programs they would like to attend. Parents/guardians return to the application at a pre-determined time to accept or decline placement offers. Placements take effect the following school year. Only students residentially zoned for Richland School District Two are eligible to apply and participate in the Richland Two Choice Program.

The Choice Program is made up of two main elements: Expanded Choice and Magnets.

Expanded Choice offers parents and students the opportunity to apply to attend a school other than the school for which they are zoned. Selection of non-zoned students is based on school capacity and determined through lottery. Parents/guardians must provide transportation.

Magnets are designed are to meet students' diverse needs and interests by maximizing potential for learning and growth; encouraging creativity; maintaining high standards; and creating an awareness of career opportunities relative to the fields of study in which students may be interested. Parents/guardians must provide transportation.

Magnets fall into one of the following three categories: Please click here for a list of all Richland Two magnets

Full school magnet - all students participate in the specialized focus of the school.

School-within-a-school magnet - have an instructional focus that varies from the full school focus. Magnet

Centers - small separate schools located in a building adjacent to a larger school campus.

How Do I Apply?

There are two online application periods for Choice. Choice 1 takes place in December/January. Choice 2 occurs in May. A few things to note:

- Not all schools and programs accept applications during Choice 2. Furthermore, some programs only have
 openings for certain grade levels. If you apply to a grade level without openings, you are applying to be
 added to the wait pool.
- If you accept a seat in a Magnet Program during Choice 1, you are ineligible to apply for other Choice options in Choice 2.
- If you apply to Magnet Programs in Choice 1, but are not selected, you do not need to re-apply in Choice 2
 for the same programs. Your Choice 1 applications remain in the waiting pool.
- If you apply to Magnet Programs in Choice 1, but are not selected, you can apply to different magnet
 programs during Choice 2. However, applying for different programs during Choice 2 will take you out of the
 waiting pools for your Choice 1 selections. Duplicate applications may result in a delay or even non-selection
 to programs.

Remember, your Residentially Zoned School is also a wonderful option! Richland Two prides itself on providing excellent educational opportunities at all our schools. You do not have to submit an application for your child to attend your zoned school or its full school magnet.

Dear Mr. Temoney

I have received your letter dated April 22, 2019, requesting a hardship appeal on behalf of Shane Shearin and Larkin Shearin to allow for eligibility at Spring Valley High School. Your letter states that the students are home school students whose address falls within the attendance zone for Richland Northeast High School, and you have represented that if the students were enrolled as traditional public-school students in the school district, they would be allowed to attend either Richland Northeast High School or Spring Valley High School. It is on these grounds that you are seeking a hardship so that the students may participate in extracurricular activities at Spring Valley High School.

Initially, I question the representation that the students would automatically be allowed to attend Spring Valley High School if they were traditional public-school students. The information from Richland School District Two's website indicates that there is an application process for students wishing to attend a public-school other than the school for which they are zoned. Furthermore, the District's information sheet states that "[s]election of non-zoned students is based on school capacity and determined through lottery." Therefore, it is speculative as to whether the appealing students would be automatically allowed to attend Spring Valley High School due to the District's limitations based on school capacity (net gain of 20) and due to the lottery process. I also note that the District's website states that the second round of choice applications is currently beginning for the 2019-2020 school year, but the District has already closed choice applications at Spring Valley High School. If I have misinterpreted the information on the District's website, please let me know.

The League's participation requirements for home school students is found in Article III, Section 6 of the League's By-Laws and provides that home-schooled students "are eligible at the public school in the attendance zone of their residence." The League has consistently applied the determination of "the public school in the attendance zone of their residence" to be the public school where the bus would take the student if he attended traditional public-school.

There are a number of school districts across the state that allow "school choice" within their respective districts, but the League's membership has chosen to adopt a rule that applies evenly to all public-school students, home schooled students, charter school students, virtual school students, and Governor's schooled students. That is, the League looks at the actual attendance zone for the student and not where the student could go.

The League's rule complies with and was based upon the Equal Access to Interscholastic Activities Act, S.C. Code Ann. § 59-63-100. Under that law, home school students may not be denied the opportunity to participate as long as the student "resides within the attendance boundaries of the school for which the student participates." § 59-63-100 (B)(3)(a). We have addressed this issue in the past, and we have consistently applied the language of our rule and of § 59-63-100 which refers to "attendance zone" and "attendance boundaries." Moreover, interpreting the statute in a way that allows a home school student to have more than one possible school within their "attendance boundary," such as in situations of district-wide school choice, provides home school students with greater rights than traditional public-school students. In other words, such an interpretation would allow a home school student to argue that he may not be denied the opportunity to participate at both schools at the same time or during alternate sports seasons within the same school year. For these reasons, the League only allows a student to have one school designated as the school within the attendance zone of his residence, and that school is always designated as the one based on physical location relative to the student's home address.

With respect to the current appeal, there have been no circumstances set forth that would constitute a hardship as defined and outlined in Article III, Section 5 of the League's Bylaws. To grant a hardship to the Shearins based on the sole fact that the District allows for choice applications to Spring Valley High School would actually put the home school students in a better position than public-school students, who are subject to capacity concerns and the randomness of the lottery selection. For these reasons, I must deny the hardship request.

If you desire to appeal this ruling, please notify me in writing so that it may be added to the agenda of the next meeting for the Executive Committee. If you have any additional questions, please do not hesitate to contact me.

Spring Valley High School (SVHS) is requesting a hardship appeal on behalf of home school students Shane Shearin and Larkin Shearin, who have requested to participate in extracurricular activities at SVHS. SVHS recognizes that this situation is not a traditional hardship; however, the parents are seeking a favorable ruling from the South Carolina High School League (SCHSL) in this matter in an attempt to avoid litigation. A lawsuit was filed against the District and the SCHSL; however, it has been dismissed at this time to determine if the SCHSL will grant the request that the students be allowed to participate in extracurricular activities at SVHS. To our knowledge, a hardship request is the only manner in which the SCHSL can consider allowing the students to participate at SVHS. Based on the students' address, if the students were enrolled in the District, they would be allowed to attend either Richland Northeast High School (RNF) or SVHS. The students' address is zoned for RNE with the option of attending SVHS. If the students were enrolled in the District, they would be allowed to participate in extracurricular activities at the school they attended, which for these students would be either RNE or SVHS. On the family's behalf, the District is requesting that the SCHSL allow the students the opportunity to participate in extracurricular activities at either the zoned or option school so that they are treated consistent with the manner in which students who are enrolled in the District are treated. Once the students select a school they would not be allowed to participate in extracurricular activities at another school unless there was a change in their residence.
